#### A Note About our Building Committee and Pending Capital Campaign

Some of you have been asking about our progress on plans for campus improvement. Below you will find a brief summary of what has been done by your elected building committee, what is being done now, and what we anticipate doing. Our co-chairs, Kelly McClain and Dan Vrana, would be glad to have further conversations if you desire.

- In August/September 2015 a feasibility study was conducted by Horizons Stewardship to help us decide what a reasonable fund raising target might be for our church at this time, based on a "case statement" of needs identified by the building committee.
- On October 6 our Horizons strategist, Don Smith, came and gave a presentation of his findings. That presentation included a summary of levels of support for areas in the case statement.
  - The highest level of support, 92%, was for deferred maintenance and administration
  - 81% of those surveyed were supportive of worship ministries projects including new carpet and upholstery and other improvements for the sanctuary.
  - 80% of those surveyed were supportive of renovations and improvements related to children and youth ministries
  - 77% of those surveyed were supportive of the project related to expanding space for music ministries
  - 72% of those surveyed supported enhancements related to hospitality and campus navigation, including providing a greatly enlarged community gathering space and improved bathrooms
  - Various comments on each of these projects indicated concern to "Know more" about each before fully committing support. All of the projects have what Horizons considers an "adequate" level of support to merit continuing efforts on each.
  - Based on the interviews, demographic information, information on attendance and giving, Horizons indicated
    that we should be able to raise 1 to 1.5 million dollars to fund these projects or some subset thereof. We
    might raise considerably more, if people are able and willing to support this effort.
- Simultaneously, our building committee continued its work to identify the most critical and immediate needs to support programming and mission fulfillment.
  - Renovating and expanding the nursery was clearly a high priority
  - A second high priority was securing our children's spaces, providing a secure check in for Sunday School, and segregating bathrooms used by children from those easily accessible to the public
  - A third high priority was providing a large meeting space, separate from the activity center, for children's gatherings, but also for large group functions throughout the week (preschool functions, adult classes --for around 40- 60 people)
  - We were concerned to provide true accessibility to upstairs classrooms, especially given the increased numbers of classes offered to adults on Sundays and Wednesdays
  - We knew we would probably not be able to fund all the items in all of our project lists at one time
- With these priorities in mind, our architect, Darrin Orndorff began working on a "master plan" that will meet ALL of the needs identified by the building committee, and on defining a series of phases that "make sense" for building projects we expect to unfold over a period of 5–7 years.
- Darrin presented a tentative "master" plan and a proposal for two distinct building phases (with multiple options in each phase), including cost estimates, first to the building committee and then to Ad Board (On October 20); to help make the decision to move forward with the capital campaign. These plans included very rough renderings and "footprints" of his proposed design.
- With those before us, we affirmed the decision to embark on a capital campaign with Horizons Stewardship guiding us to raise funds for "Phase 1."

- Phase I will PROBABLY include the following, if funding is available (we are still working to define our most important needs):
  - Expansion of the nursery to include the choir room for 3 and 4 year olds; renovation so that there is a separate but connected infant room and a toddler room
  - That means the music ministry must be relocated. The "best" space for them with least expense and modification seems to be the current front office/reception/pastor office complex, with the addition of areas built out to the arches to serve as robe rooms and storage areas.
  - To do this most efficiently the main office will be moved toward the east in the same building, and will be expanded to the edge of the current colonnade.
  - Addition of a large children/adult/youth gathering space in the area just in front (west) of the two story education wing.
  - Addition of large new bathrooms for adults on the south west corner of that gathering space. These will eventually become the bathrooms for the sanctuary.
  - Addition of a large meeting space above the bathrooms (2<sup>nd</sup> floor) that will probably serve as a senior high room at least for "phase 1."
  - Addition of a full service elevator that will make our 2<sup>nd</sup> floor fully functional and accessible all week long to all groups and persons who need classrooms for use
  - Enclosure of the children's areas by adding glass enclosed colonnades on the west and south sides that will also serve as an entrance to both children's and office/reception areas. This will drastically reduce the number of entrances to the facility (a huge security plus).
  - Renovation of existing bathrooms to serve "for children only" during certain hours
  - Creation of a corridor through to the preschool in the bathroom area (bathrooms will be smaller) to increase functionality and safety
  - Moving pre school office from the back into the area currently used as room 133.
  - Options for this phase, if there is enough funding include:
    - continuing the glass colonnade to the back parking lot and securing the remainder of our campus classroom access, segregating children from adults in all settings.
    - Renovating sanctuary "finishes" flooring, upholstery, perhaps demo'ing the current bathrooms once the new ones are available and using the space for other things
    - We may be required to provide ADA access to the chancel area once construction begins. If so, this will
      require chancel modification.
- Phase 2 (some FUTURE capital campaign will raise these funds!) will PROBABLY include building new
  youth rooms and worship storage areas between sanctuary and activity center, building a hospitality center to
  the west of the sanctuary to connect the colonnade from Phase 1 to the sanctuary and activity center, and
  renovation of the narthex/lobby and chancel areas (including ADA accessibility to all areas, if not required
  before this stage).

I hope this "word picture" will give you a sense of the things in the mix as we work toward final decisions about affordability and needs.

The capital campaign to fund all of this will begin with a "first meeting" of the team on Nov 12. The team will be introduced to the congregation on December 6. The campaign will move into full swing, with renderings and floor plans available successively to groups beginning in January. By the end of February a detailed brochure will be available to the entire congregation, with renderings and drawings.

We hope you will anticipate this campus improvement process with eagerness and joy as we move into the future God has for us!



## Wednesday Programming

Each Wednesday night begins with sharing a meal in the Activity Center. Dinner begins at 5:45pm and is \$3/person or \$12/family. Adult Education classes that began in August are starting to wind down, new classes begin the first week of November, others begin in December. The Wednesday evening adult education programming has experienced significant growth. Five classes have been taught on this night, in addition to Confirmation class plus Wednesday WILDS. The church is averaging over 70 people participating on Wednesdays.

## Blue Christmas Service

Pain and sorrow can be devastating, particularly during the Christmas Season. In a season which is centered around the expectation of joy, when feelings of guilt, anxiety and depression occur, our hearts are often heavy laden with feelings of failure and bitter disappointment.

On Sunday, December 6<sup>th</sup>, 2015, at 4 p.m., First United Methodist Church will host a Blue Christmas Service, in the Church Sanctuary. This is a service of hope which is dedicated to anyone who experiences feelings of pain and sorrow during the Christmas season. We know that the greatest healing is a reunion of reconciliation between human beings and God. Therefore, this service of worship has been designed for anyone who has encountered the loss of a job, for persons grieving after the loss of pregnancy, for persons going through divorce, for anyone who is suffering from addiction or substance abuse. This service is for anyone who feels blue during the Christmas season.

It is the church's dearest hope that you will find this service of worship to be therapeutic and comforting and that you will leave renewed and restored under the spiritual powers of the healing Christ. You are cordially invited to this worship service of hope and restoration. Pastor Tina Rees will be delivering the message for this service.



## Our Godly Investment By Rev. David Harriss

The lectionary text for Sunday, November 8<sup>th</sup>, 2015, comes from Mark 12:28-34. We find ourselves in the fall of 2015 where we look ahead to Charge Conference, stewardship month, and creating ministry budgets for the 2016 fiscal calendar year. To add to this list, the church is also considering a long-term building campaign which will require financial dedication. All of these fall commitments involve financial decisions which will affect the ministries of the church. Lodged in the midst of these daunting financial decisions is the scripture of the *The Widow's Offering*.

This text has often been deliberately misinterpreted in order to excuse ourselves from acts of faithful giving by misrepresenting her act of faithfulness. She only placed in the offering plate a few cents. That is what I will give as well. After all, Jesus seems to glorify this woman's contribution so he should be happy with whatever I give. However, upon closer examination of this text, we see Christ's stated words, she gave everything she had, all she had to live on (NRSV). In her sacrificial act of giving, this unnamed woman acts unselfishly in order to give a full investment into the treasury. In this public critique, Jesus exposes the religious leader's hypocrisy and he may very well be exposing our hypocrisy as well.

Earlier within this scripture, Jesus states that the *scribes* (religious leaders during the Greco-Roman Empire) *like to walk around in long robes, like to be greeted with respect in the marketplaces, have the best seats in the synagogues and at banquets* and that they *devour widow's houses*. The exact understanding of what *devouring widow's homes* means is unclear. However, we can interpret this text to mean that religious leaders were engaging in immoral social/economic practices, concluding with removing widows out of their homes. Jesus makes a connection between the scribes' corrupt policies which allow them remove a *widow (chera)* from her home (to take advantage of collecting equity) and the fact that this same widow gave everything she had. In a public setting, Christ contrasts the religious leader's corrupt handling of the widow whom they had vilified and proceeds to honor her by exposing her faithful contribution. These spiritual leaders considered themselves entitled to honor in social settings because they were honored by God. By contrast, Jesus illustrates that the widow's faithful offering was truly honorable.

Is this a text about Jesus' conviction of the religious caste and their way of doing things? Perhaps. Was Christ challenging the church to be more fair and just with the poor? Maybe. However, what is also highly notable is this woman's willingness to invest fully in the Lord. In Ancient Israel, provisions were made so that the poor did not have to give to the treasury. Therefore, she did not give to the treasury from a perspective of duty, obligation, or responsibility. She gave to the treasury with a complete confidence that God would provide for her every need. The scribes gave only a portion *out of their abundance* due to their lack of faith in a provisional God. She gave everything that she had due

to her complete faith and confidence in a provisional God.

So what about us? Do we believe in this same provisional God which the widow believed in? Do we believe that God will provide for our every need? Or, are we like the scribes who give only a portion from our abundance? We live in an affluent community. We live in an affluent nation. Yet, we often fail to give our 10<sup>th</sup> to the Lord because we don't have enough faith in a provisional God. Whatever you invest in the Lord in 2016, give freely with a complete confidence that God will continue to provide you with extravagant abundance.



## Cardboard City by Ryan Collins

On Saturday, October 17<sup>th</sup>, 20 students and 7 adult leaders traveled to Scottsdale Stadium for the annual event hosted by Family Promise of Greater Phoenix, *Cardboard City*. Cardboard City is an event Family Promise coordinates for two purposes: first, it helps Family Promise raise funds for the great work they do to combat family homelessness in Phoenix-metro, and second, it helps raise awareness to the issues and problems facing families in our city—not just for the event participants but for the local news and sponsors.




At the event, we learned that there are approximately 4,300 families in Phoenix who are currently suffering from homelessness. Let that number sink in for a bit: 4,300 families. There are 4,300 families who are living out of their cars or without proper shelter, trying to maintain a regular schedule for their children, and trying to keep it all together when they have nothing left. We also learned that Family Promise has one of the highest success rates in helping families regain stability—housing, jobs, school, etc. The issue, in my opinion, is that such a proven organization is only able to help about 100 families a year. With more awareness of the plight of family homelessness complimented with an increase in resources, maybe Family Promise would be able to help more families or at the least raise up other individuals and organizations who are passionate about helping those who most need it.

In raising awareness of family homelessness, Cardboard City gives students and adult leaders an opportunity to experience what life is like sleeping in less-than-ideal conditions—a cardboard box. Ron Mason, the Youth Ministry Chair, built a lighthouse out of cardboard and the students decorated the structure. It was our main identification marker for our group at the event. It also happened to win an award! The students decorated and slept in refrigerator sized boxes after an evening of music from bands, a movie showing of *The Pursuit of Happyness* featuring Will Smith, and also a packing session of 2,000 hygiene kits to be passed out to those suffering from homelessness. Students, leaders, and groups were encouraged to take some of their own hygiene kits home as we departed the event to pass them out to help meet their immediate needs and hope it points them to Family Promise.

The event was fun, but also humbling. The main thing Family Promise wants communicated during Cardboard City is that we only experience a small fraction of what it's like to be homeless. We sleep with pillows and blankets in a box with some luxuries brought with us, in an enclosed area that is protected by Scottsdale police, able to eat a hearty dinner with water bottles available, bathrooms open for our use, coffee and doughnuts in the morning, and the ability to return to a home with a warm shower waiting for us before we return to our daily activities of life. Imagine life at the extreme of Cardboard City without access to any of those privileges—that's reality for 4,300 families and many more individuals in our city. It is sobering...

It is my hope that Cardboard City has helped raise awareness, not just in our city, but in the lives of the students here at our church. We care about so many things that do not matter. It is my prayer that the Holy Spirit convict us of what truly matters and may the Spirit empower us to live lives meeting the spiritual and physical needs of others. When we do that—and students can grasp that—then we are living and fulfilling the law of Christ (Gal. 6:2).



### **Family Promise**

The Youth did an amazing job of learning about homelessness and how Family Promise works. The agency utilizes 160,000 volunteers across 41 states. It's now our turn to assist to do our part to help the homeless in our own community.

We will be hosting Family Promise the week of November 15th – 22<sup>nd</sup>. To enhance the experience for the families and reduce the stress on our members, we are dividing this ministry into four parts. These parts are linens, food donations, dinners and overnights. Each of these segments will need a coordinator. A coordinator will assimilate the volunteers for their respected area. If this is something you MAY be interested in please contact the missions team at missions@gilbertumc.org. For our experienced volunteers who have found this ministry rewarding, now may be the time to help lead a portion of this ministry.

Also, please let us know if you are willing to help with linens during the week when sheets need to be washed due to change of families and returned that same day by 5:00pm.

We are still in need of volunteers for various items in each area.

Last time Family Promise was here we provided



housing and food for 19 people. With your help we are excited to serve more families in November.
